

Short description / Kurzbeschreibung

"A lonely man on the brink of emotional desolation talks to his Oatmeal. His need for friendship compels the man to a bizarre act."

The short film Bowl of Oatmeal, originally released in 1996 on 16 mm, is the final project, a group work, done by six students during an eleven-week intensive film course at New York University – SCE (School of Continuing Education). After its first showings in New York and Philadelphia the film went to many film festivals around the world.

Now it will be made available for the first time in a digital format through the "play loud! archive & store".

This darkly comical short was included in EI Independent Cinema's anthologized VHS release of "Cutting Moments." This is definitely the strangest one, as it's about a seriously disturbed loner who imagines (?) that his only friend is his talking bowl of oatmeal. When the guy begins to unhealthily obsess over what he can do with meat, a rift is driven between them. In tone and thematics, the absurd, pathetic alienation and insanity of this story brings "Eraserhead" to mind, but it's definitely it's own beast. A talking bowl of oatmeal, mental illness and raw meat. Combine the three and you've got one hell of a film. The dark short tells of a lonely shut-in who is taunted by a talking bowl of breakfast porridge. Isolation, despair and madness eventually lead the man to construct an imaginary lover. Dietmar Post's BOWL OF OATMEAL could gel alongside Jim Van Bebber's ROADKILL as a low budget exploration of isolation, despair and insanity. The central character is an overweight loner hidden away in his flea-pit bed-sit, who instigates a conversation with a bowl of porridge. The cereal advises the man to get a hobby - and suggests the likes of fishing, horse riding and chess. Rubbishing these suggestions (so he's not COMPLETELY insane then!), the man instead chooses to rob a stack of meat from his local butchers. Why? Watch it! You'll enjoy the final frame!


